ABOUT ACC-OC:

The Association of California Cities – Orange County (ACC-OC) represents the regional policy interests of Orange County cities and special districts, collectively serving up to 3.2 million residents. ACC-OC fosters collaboration across county borders on regional, state, and federal policy issues, advocating for solutions that enhance local governance and community well-being. The Association is committed to empowering our member agencies through educational programing, developing collaborative policies, and advancing service-driven advocacy. Its diverse membership—comprising cities, special districts, private businesses, nonprofits, and higher education institutions—works together to address Orange County's evolving challenges and opportunities.

Budget

- Safeguard local revenue sources from state budget reductions, ensuring continued funding for local agencies to advance shared priorities in climate action, energy, housing, infrastructure, and water policy.
- Preserve funding for the University of California and California State University systems to maintain student access, support
 academic success, and strengthen California's workforce development.

Energy, Environment and Water

- Support modernization and comprehensive reforms to the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) to streamline the development of critical energy, housing, transportation, and water infrastructure.
- Expedite permitting and regulatory review processes to accelerate the expansion of California's electric grid and ensure the timely delivery of essential infrastructure.
- · Advocate for legislation that expands the use of renewable hydrogen to advance California's clean energy goals.

Housing and Homelessness

- **Collaborate with cities to incentivize increased housing production**, including reforms to the Regional Housing Needs Assessment (RHNA) process, CEQA modernization, and expanded access to tax credits and grants.
- Sustain funding for the Regional Early Action Planning (REAP) program to support city-led housing and planning initiatives.
- Ensure counties and cities have maximum flexibility in utilizing Proposition 1 funds to address homelessness, expand behavioral health services, and support sober living homes—while maintaining local oversight of for-profit providers.
- Support legislation that strengthens oversight and regulation of sober living and recovery treatment facilities, in response to the 2024 JLAC audit of DCHS, to enhance client and patient protections. Key bills include AB 3 (Dixon), AB 423 (Davies), AB 424 (Davies), AB 425 (Davies), AB 448 (Patel), AB 492 (Valencia), and SB 329 (Blakespear).

Economic Development & Tourism

- Foster job growth and economic development to enhance California's competitiveness as a premier tourism destination.
- Support workforce development initiatives that provide specialized training for careers in healthcare, tourism, biotechnology, and high-tech industries.
- Advance public safety reforms to combat retail theft, address the fentanyl crisis, and support cities in managing rising criminal activity
 that impacts local economies, sales tax revenues, and public safety costs.

Transportation

- Work with local transportation agencies on proposed changes to funding priorities and project selection, while promoting a cooperative, partnership-based approach to SB 375 reforms.
- Advocate for transportation funding and policies—including national toll interoperability—to support essential multimodal mobility improvements and services.
- Partner with cities to expand Electric Vehicle (EV) infrastructure and secure funding to achieve the state's zero-emission vehicle goals, with a focus on minimizing compliance costs associated with zero-emission mandates.

Healthcare and Community Services

- Expand funding for veterans, seniors, and at-risk populations to enhance access to healthcare, housing, and essential services.
- Advance initiatives that improve access to mental healthcare, affordable housing, and workforce development in Orange County.
- **Support integrated care models** that combine housing, healthcare, and support services, including transitional and permanent supportive housing solutions.
